

## What is Low Dose Naltrexone (LDN)?

- Naltrexone in doses of 50mg or higher is an opioid antagonist. However in lower doses of Naltrexone such as 0.5mg to 4.5mg it is occasionally used to manage a variety of conditions in animals such as: pain, autoimmune conditions, canine compulsive disorder, cancer, mood disorders, arthritis, inflammation, seizures, and skin disorders. When traditional medications have not worked, it may be suitable to try LDN.

Veterinarians may prescribe LDN for dogs, cats, piglets, and even farm animals.

### LDN for veterinary use

Few veterinarians know about the benefits of LDN in dogs that have behavioral issues. Dogs with behavioral troubles often take the medication orally, usually in a liquid form. Studies have shown that LDN can be effective for lessening compulsive behaviors such as obsessive licking, and tail chasing as well as many other conditions. ### LDN Dosing for animals *(Note\* You May need BID dosing due to fast metabolism)*

Less than 10 lbs	Give	1mg
11 lbs to 19 lbs	Give	1.5mg
20 lbs to 30 lbs	Give	2mg
31 lbs to 45 lbs	Give	3mg
46 lbs to 75lbs	Give	4mg
76 lbs and above	Give	4.5mg
